#### **Ghana:**



Brad has used our tests for many years...however he recently wrote: "In Yeji, Ghana. Have never tested so many children, with so many positives for malaria. Thank you Alynne!"



Above is an example of a test which is positive for malaria. The control line at "C" confirms that the test worked properly and you can trust the results. The line at "2" means the patient has some form of malaria. The line at "1" confirms that the patient has Plasmodium falciparum (the deadliest form of malaria).

### <u>Uganda:</u>

Alan and Elena serve with Baptist International Missions in Uganda. their own words: "We are not going to Uganda to administer a full time medical clinic. We wish to only use medicine as an instrument to reach the hearts, and win the souls of the Ugandan people with the Gospel. The clinic that we shall operate will be part time, as to have ample opportunity for us to evangelize in out of the way villages. We wish to win the hearts and souls of the people not just by telling them about Jesus' love for them, but demonstrating that love through the medical ministry." Science with a Mission diagnostics are a small part of their medical ministry.
